Dear Partners and Friends,

Each week, I am inspired by the neighbors we serve across 26 counties in East Texas. Their journeys have not been easy. Many will tell you of hardship and heartache of trying to survive in a difficult economy. However, the one thing they have in common is HOPE. That is what our mission statement says we do. We fight hunger and feed hope. That is what keeps our team energized each day; realizing we are making a difference in the number of people who are food insecure.

This year, we opened three new resource centers in Longview, Tyler and Texarkana to join our center that opened in Lufkin in 2021. East Texans are able to access healthy food they select and receive information on other resources such as applying for benefits. One stylist for example offers free haircuts in Longview. In Tyler, we have offered financial literacy training from a local bank, which our neighbors greatly appreciate.

ETFB opened new mobile pantries in Gilmer, Grand Saline, Jacksonville, Nacogdoches, and Seven Points. People enjoy receiving fresh produce at our 29 mobile pantries.

I am humbled by how generous East Texas individuals, businesses, and foundations are with their financial support. We could not do what we do without you. Our new signature event, Empty Bowls Tyler was such a great success we are adding an Empty Bowls Longview. We appreciate your continued investment in the lives of East Texans.

I continue to be thrilled with how many East Texans volunteer at ETFB. Over 11,000 volunteers contributed 34,000 hours by packing boxes, sorting through food donations, shopping with neighbors, and helping mobile pantries.

Recently my toddler grandson asked his mom, "Where's Pops?" She explained to him I was at work. He then responded, "Pops helps people." WOW! I had a tear in my eye and lump in my throat as she told me that story. What I took from this, people know we help people. Staff members, board members, volunteers and donors help those in need. We do not do it for recognition. So thank you for helping our neighbors. It is truly a privilege and an honor to get to do what we do!

#### Opened October 2023

Alex, 85, enjoys supplementing his weekly groceries with fresh produce and other nutritious food like hazelnuts at the Longview Resource Center (LRC). Alex is retired and a widower. He learned to take care of himself after his wife of 43 years, Betty, was murdered at work during a bank robbery.

The LRC is located in a low-income neighborhood where 31% of the population lives below the poverty line. The center provides nutritious food through a neighborchoice distribution model, which allows people like Alex to choose food that is best for them.

"I used to be able to give donations to ETFB, but never thought I would need your services," added Alex.





#### **REVENUE & SUPPORT** Total \$74,909,889




